#### **Enhanced Partnerships: statutory consultation requirements**

- BSIPs are not statutory documents; consultation <u>not</u> required by law
- Enhanced Partnership Plans (EPPs) and Schemes (EPSs) are statutory documents and consultation <u>is</u> required by law (Transport Act 2000, s.138F)



# **Statutory consultees**

Main focus of requirement is identifying WHO must be consulted:

- All affected operators
- User representatives
- Affected local authorities
- Traffic Commissioner
- Police
- Transport Focus
- Competition and Markets Authority

Government guidance also mentions MPs and, when modifying services major local employers and 'existing passengers on affected services' (s.5)

## Approach to consultation

- The Act does <u>not</u> define HOW authorities need to consult
- But it is implicit that draft EP documents on which you are consulting need to be made available
- EP <u>must</u> include plan for consulting users on how well Plan and Scheme are working: Transport Act 2000, s138A (8)



### **Duration of consultation**

- Length of the consultation not defined in law
- Best practice in consultations is three months unlikely to be an option for EPs
- In practice, some authorities may only be able to fit in a consultation of between four and six weeks
- Allow time to analyse, report and consider responses and to modify the Plan and Scheme if required
- Certain types of changes would require authorities to reopen the statutory 28-day objections process, so changes should contribute to BSIP outcomes (see Government guidance section 6.2)
- Starting the consultation later than January would allow little time to complete these processes

## Lawfulness of consultations

- In addition to complying with the letter of the statutory requirements, LTAs should be aware of the 'Gunning Principles' which govern the lawfulness of all consultations.
- There are four principles:
  - Consultation must take place when policies are at a formative stage
  - Sufficient information/reasons should be provided to allow for intelligent consideration of proposals
  - Adequate time must be allowed for consultees to consider and respond to proposals
  - Responses must be conscientiously taken into account



# Purpose of EP consultation

- To comply with the statutory requirement and follow the Government guidance
- To raise awareness and understanding of your proposals for improving bus services?
- To provide (further) opportunity to comment on and influence those proposals?



## Listening to consultees

Responses can be considered in relation to the following:

- Current Enhanced Partnership Plans and Schemes
- Future variations to Enhanced Partnership Plan (Transport Act 2000 s.138K)
- Additional Enhanced Partnership Schemes (Transport Act 2000 s.138A(2))
- Revisions to your Bus Service Improvement Plan
- Bus Passenger Charter



## What to ask and how to ask it

- Content of Plan and Scheme/s: e.g. how they are helping to implement your policies and achieve your objectives, requirements on operators, facilities and measures (Transport Act 2000 s.138A)
- Include question on plan for consulting users on how well
  Plan and Scheme are working: Transport Act 2000, s138A (8)
  see next slide
- Opportunity to comment: open questions



#### Plan for consulting users on how well your EP is working

- Who to consult: include local businesses, people with protected characteristics, elected representatives (see our first BSIP guidance on passenger representation)
- How to consult: consider passenger research as well as consultation
- When to consult: consider alongside revisions of BSIP and review of performance against targets
- What to ask and what information to provide: include performance information, ask about outcomes and measures

- Outcome report: what is the outcome of your consideration of their comments?
- How to communicate
